Are your Birds Cold??



It's been cold out there, how do birds handle the cold? Most birds with a good feather cover can tolerate cold temps as long as they have shelter and plenty of food access and fresh warm water daily. When it's super cold the hens are likely to stop laying and will conserve their feed for maintaining body heat. Fresh clean bedding also helps to keep your birds warm as well as no open windows or drafts. Try to get your birds warm water daily, even if it's just 1X a day. Maybe have 2 waterers, one thawing in your mudroom that alternates with a fresh warm one when chores are done each day.

If your hen does lay an egg that freezes, if it's cracked, discard, as bacteria can enter the crack (even in cold weather). Be patient, you'll get eggs again once it warms up. If you have ducks, keep them on bedding during the worst cold as their little web feet can freeze easily. Once it's warmed up over 30, they are safe to roam.
